1. Why do you want to serve on the Public Ethics Commission?

I believe it is my civic duty to serve my community by helping to ensure that the residents of the City of Oakland are treated fairly, with honesty and integrity. The best way to do that is by serving on the Public Ethics Commission.

I have experience dealing with relationship of trust and confidence. In my legal practice, I routinely investigate, evaluate, and litigate violations of fiduciary and ethical duties by attorneys, trustees, directors, officers, and other fiduciaries.

I am also an experienced Committee member and leader. I am the Chair of the Ethics Subcommittee, of the American Bar Association's (the "ABA") Litigation Section's Commercial & Business Litigation Committee. I was the immediate past-Chair of the Alternative Dispute Resolution Subcommittee of the ABA's Litigation Section's Commercial & Litigation Committee. I am currently the Chair of an exploratory committee organized pursuant to a request by the State Bar of California to advise the Board of Trustees on how the current economic climate will affect young lawyers' ability to competently serve the public in the coming years.

I also work well under pressure. As the Northern California District Representative of the ABA's Young Lawyers Division, I currently work with the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") to provide disaster legal services to victims of FEMA-declared disasters in California.

1. Why do you want to serve on the Public Ethics Commission?

Since retiring in 2008 as a professor at the University of San Francisco, I have wanted to serve my city – Oakland -- in some way. The Public Ethics Commission offers an ideal fit for my skills and interests.

2. What skills and qualifications will you bring to the Commission?

I would bring a range of academic skills and experiences to the Commission. With a Harvard PhD, I started out well-grounded with strong analytic and research training. As a professor at the University of San Francisco I was awarded the USF College Service Award (2003), the University Distinguished Research Award (2006), and the Sarlo Prize for Excellence in Teaching (2007). I was also honored for my academic achievements with the passage of a California Senate Resolution honoring me on May 9, 2007. There are many elements from my academic career as a political scientist, especially in teaching and publishing, that could contribute to my work on the Commission

Teaching: Most of the wide range of courses I have taught have been about American politics and society. They include courses on homelessness, on the American Presidency, bureaucracy, and on public policy. Many of my classes also engaged important ethical issues. Two prominent examples of this are my Senior Seminar on “Politics and Individual Responsibility” and my Public Administration Internship course where students read about, experienced, and reflected on public agency behavior. In fact, if you add up all of my students through the decades, who were interns in public agencies as a result of this one public administration internship course, the number adds up to over a thousand.

Publishing: As an academic, I have written dozens of articles and two very relevant recent books, one on “whistleblowing” and one on “corruption.” These books are on subjects very much related to “ethics” and their preparation gives me a unique background for work on the Commission.

3 What interests would you like to pursue while serving on the Commission?

I have a number of interests that I would like to pursue but the one that I am most enthusiastic about is my interest in creating opportunities for Bay Area students to work as free interns at the Commission. My experience as coordinator of the USF public administration internship program would inform my efforts. For organizing a formal relationship between colleges, universities, even high schools and the Commission, I could help advertise the intern opportunity, and create the contact forms and evaluation forms for such a program. My own work with my USF internship program sensitizes me to what colleges and their students are looking for in an agency when they are choosing places to intern. For attracting students, I could help prepare a simple description of the Commission and its mission and a clear description of some of the tasks and skills the students could expect to learn.

My interest in, and extensive knowledge about whistleblowing is another area that could be pursued while serving on the Commission. Because of my book, *Whistleblowing: When It Works and Why*, (2003) I have been invited by two Bay Area Civil Grand Juries to assist them with my expertise. In 2003, the San Mateo Civil Grand Jury wanted help in understanding whistleblower protections so they might recommend adopting them in their final report; the San Francisco Civil Grand Jury, in 2011, wanted assistance in improving the whistleblower protections

already in place in San Francisco. If the Commission decided to evaluate Oakland's laws and procedures related to whistleblowers, I would be ready to help.

- 4 Please list any governmental experience, activities with civic and business organizations, neighborhood groups, or any other experience that would contribute to your effectiveness as a Commissioner.

There are many professional experiences that I believe would contribute to my effectiveness as a Commissioner but I will highlight only one: my formal academic engagement in the area of ethics. In addition to my two books, my publications include essays in the *Oxford Handbook on White Collar Crime*, in an American Bar Association publication, in a Law School Journal, and in a book for High School students, *Guiding Students from Cheating and Plagiarism to Honesty and Integrity*.

I have also presented papers at international Ethics Conferences -- in Jerusalem, Stockholm and in Brisbane, and my presentations in China were almost all at the University of Electronic Science and Technology of China (UESTC) in Chengdu. The 2007 presentation at UESTC, comparing United States and Chinese corruption was a highlight for me. I presented in a large, crowded auditorium with two sets of slides, one in English, and one in Chinese, shown simultaneously. The subject provoked many questions and, like all the other times I presented on that campus, a large crowd formed around me, afterwards; they were interested in asking more questions, but out of the limelight.
