Council President and Members:

Last year during on May 23, 2013, As chair I appeared before the Special Concurrent Meeting of the Oakland Redevelopment Successor Agency/City Council meeting, and spoke on behalf of the Community Policing Advisory Board regarding on the Mayor's Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2013-2015 City's budget deliberations and the impact on Community Policing.

At that time, the Board recommended that the City restore the funding that once provided to the NCPCs for the purposes of supporting outreach efforts within each neighborhood.

First implemented in 2005, the Community Policing funding, an amount of \$50,000 of the City's budget provided approximately \$700 per Community Policing Beat each year for the volunteer NCPCs. Funding was eliminated in 2009 without the consultation of the Community Policing Advisory Board.

Oakland City Council Resolution No. 79235

Section 5 — Citywide Organization, 5.9 *The City Council shall provide the Community Policing Advisory Board with sufficient funding for its activities, including attendance at conferences, observation of community policing programs elsewhere in the country, and retaining consultants to assist it with its responsibilities.*

The Board feels it is essential to restore the volunteer NCPC funding to support required community outreach and promote safety and community involvement.

Some past examples of this include:

- Personal Safety devices distribution to residents during organized walking patrol group
- Postcards, cloth shopping bags, First Aid kits and t-shirts promoting the NCPC
- Banners displayed every month outside of the meeting location to advertise and encourage greater participation as well as covering the cost of meeting locations and meeting supplies such as flip charts, pens ...

I ask that this funding request be considered during the "2014 Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Act" deliberations.

Mayor Quan, City Administrator:

Our City government continues to find ways to fund outside programs to assist in public safety. As the City of Oakland Community Policing Advisory Board (CPAB) we are requesting the same consideration with our public safety efforts.

Last year on May 23, 2013, As chair I appeared before the Special Concurrent Meeting of the Oakland Redevelopment Successor Agency/City Council meeting, and spoke on behalf of the CPAB regarding on the Mayor's Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2013-2015 City's budget deliberations and the impact on Community Policing.

Since that time, I have continued to ask Council to restore the funding that once provided the CPAB and NCPCs the necessary financial support to assist in the facilitation of much needed community outreach efforts within each neighborhood.

In 2009, after the allocated funding was eliminated without the consultation of the CPAB, NCPC and community members, a noticeably declined in NCPC activities and participation by community members has continued. Some NCPCs note this lack of funding serves as an impediment to their good work.

Oakland City Council Resolution No. 79235, Section 5 — Citywide Organization, 5.9 states "The City Council shall provide the Community Policing Advisory Board with sufficient funding for its activities, including attendance at conferences, observation of community policing programs elsewhere in the country, and retaining consultants to assist it with its responsibilities."

Some past examples of this good work by volunteers include:

- Required annual citywide Community Policing Summit
- Required community outreach in each beat and fulfill NCPC re-certification requirements
- Personal Safety devices, Postcards, First Aid kits and t-shirts promoting the NCPC
- Banners to advertise meeting location and encourage greater participation as well as covering the cost of meeting locations and meeting supplies such as flip charts, pens ...

We ask for your response and the restoration of funding immediately to ensure the volunteers can resume their needed good work in the community.



Council President Kernighan and Members of the Council:

Subject: Item 12: Submitting Public Safety Ballot Measure for November Election, July 15, 2014, Concurrent Meeting of the Oakland Redevelopment Successor Agency and the City Council

The Community Policing Advisory Board (CPAB) met July 2, 2014 in City Council Chamber to hold its regularly scheduled meeting that featured a discussion with OPD Assistant Chief Figueroa, OFD Chief Reed, Human Services Manager Peter Kim, and Ceasefire Program Director Reygan Harmon in regards to the Public Safety and Services Ballot Measure.

Using a July 2, 2014 dated "Redlined version of the proposed resolution with public safety committee recommended changes" document, Board Members heard public input, and discussed the Public Safety and Services Ballot Measure with the various invitees.

The following represents the questions and comments made by Board Members¹:

- Question: What is the measure going to do for me personally?
- Question: Are nonprofits |churches exempted from paying, if they own property?
- Question: What is the exemption process for low-income residents?
- Question: Voters paid for the previous measure and feel promises were broken. What is it about this measure that will fix things?
- Question: What are the past cost and OPD resources of the Ceasefire program?
- Question: When will the COPS grant expire?
- Question: Will all beats have a PSO (CRO) assigned
- Question: If is measure does not pass, will there be an OPD be lay-off?
- Comment: Some residents are paying for private security. What is in it for them?
- Comment: Do not give tax reductions for vacant lots etc.
- Comment: Do not dilute effectiveness by expanding the scope of the measure.
- Comment: Would like specific language on community policing.
- Comment: Measure should be bifurcated into two measures e.g. Police & Services.
- Comment: Would like more money for this measure.
- Comment: Would like a no layoff clause for OPD.
- Comment: Would like an unconditional OPD staffing minimum.
