

Patrol Division, Third Watch 2007 Annual Report

The Patrol Division, Third Watch comprised patrol and late tac units (hereafter “The Watch” or “Watch”) encompassed the 3:30 pm to 1:30 am patrol shift and 1700 to 0300 late tac shift. The Watch provided a citywide uniformed response to calls for service, acted as a visible deterrent to crime and disorder, and engaged in community policing. The Watch worked closely with other organizational units, City departments, outside agencies, and neighboring law enforcement jurisdictions.

Although most of the authorized positions were filled, loss of personnel due to illness, injury, vacation, mandatory training, and loans to other organizational units created work force shortages throughout the year. No hiring freezes affected the Watch. Years of service for retirements was not tracked. No Promotions from Third Watch took place.

Fiscal management was primarily handled at the Bureau level.

O&M

As a result of mild overspending in 2006, elective purchase of office furniture and office-related supplies was better scrutinized.

Personnel

These costs excluded civilian and sworn overtime. There was insufficient funding and, in some cases, no budget at all to cover regular salary, modified duty, educational expenses, retirement costs, and fringe benefits.

Overtime

Overtime costs exceeded budgeted appropriations due to backfilling of all ranks assigned to the Watch, managing critical incidents, extensions of shift, completing mandatory training, and meeting strict investigative deadlines for misconduct complaints alleged against Watch personnel.

In addition to formal training, Watch members and employees participated in line up training on legal updates, review of current law enforcement best practices, officer safety updates, and candid discussions regarding the state of the Department and prospective changes.

Personnel from the Watch also taught at the Department's Basic Recruit Academy and In-Service training seminars. Those instructional activities included firearms use and safety, vehicle operations, first aid, patrol procedures, and defensive tactics.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Urgent calls for service permitting, Watch personnel provided regular and focused enforcement in high stressor crime areas and target locations identified by PSA Commanders. Staff worked hard to bridge the gap between the Patrol Division and Strategic Area Command. Moreover, Watch staff focused on traffic enforcement, pedestrian stops, and maintaining a visual presence. No new or on going programs were initiated. Sgt. Larry Riggs received the Spirit Award for his

handling of Officer Stan Mock's death in Concord, CA. In addition, Watch personnel participated in the following:

- Street robbery suppression projects;
- Mobile Field Force deployments;
- Third Watch Training Day;
- Achievement of 100% NSA training compliance;
- Achievement of 100% community and bi-weekly meeting compliance; and
- PSA violence suppression activities.

PRODUCTIVITY PERFORMANCE DATA

Arrests, citation, vehicle seizure information, and more are illustrated below. In spite of responding to the highest number of calls for service, the Watch consistently outperformed other patrol watches in proactivity. Since taking command of the Watch in late May of 2005, staff performed well in attending community meetings and completing bi-weekly subordinate meetings with compliance in both areas remaining at or near 100%. Further, staff completed performance evaluations in a timely fashion. No criminal investigations were initiated or cleared outside of the course and scope of normal patrol duties; no policies were completed; no projects were closed; no warrants were written. Two audits were conducted: one on Stop Data Forms, the other on Arrest Approvals.

IAD investigations completed by Watch personnel revealed no negative patterns. Nothing abnormal was noted in the uses of force and all force incidents appeared to comport with Departmental Policy. Most applications of force consisted of Taser® use, takedowns, followed by occasional baton and hand strikes. Adverse driving patterns involving inattention to the driver's surroundings was discovered, which were addressed through line up and remedial driver's training hosted by the Training Division. No problems with vehicle pursuits were noted.

When individuals demonstrated at-risk behavior, punitive and non-punitive corrective measures were utilized.

PLANS, EXPECTATIONS, AND GOALS

State of the Unit

There is a strong sense of teamwork and motivation between members and employees of the Watch. As time allowed, staff diligently addressed crime and disorder across the city. Watch personnel also consistently led the other patrol watches in proactive stops made and calls for service handled. Although I am very proud of the ladies and gentlemen of the Watch, there is room for improvement in crime fighting and Watch cohesiveness.

Transfers and loans to fill Measure Y funded positions, other organizational vacancies, and newly formed units resulted in a loss of experienced personnel. This created a less knowledgeable, less skilled, and less capable patrol force.

Of particular note, poorly working radios and batteries, a depleted number of vehicles, and vehicles in poor condition persisted through the year.

Plans, Expectations, and Goals

In 2008, I plan and expect to accomplish the following:

- Make geographic command viable and effective in Area 3;
- Create a leadership environment for others to replicate;
- Increase job satisfaction of rank and file officers, supervisors, and commanders;

- Sustain full compliance with the NSA;
- Inspire officers to aggressively fight crime within the parameters of law, policy, and ethics;
- Place a greater emphasis on community engagement in crime reduction and other self-help initiatives;
- Increase collaboration between patrol officers, problem solving officers; and crime reduction teams;
- Increase formal and informal training opportunities for Area 3 personnel.
